



Getting around Jakarta efficiently depends on your location and daily routines.

MRT

The MRT is the fastest way to move between Central and South Jakarta, with fares averaging **Rp 10,000** per trip.

Ride-Hailing

Grab and Gojek are the most common choices:

- Short rides: **Rp 15,000–25,000**
- Medium distances: **Rp 30,000–40,000**

Airport Access

From Thamrin or Kemang, the airport is about **45–60 minutes** away via toll.

Driving & Tolls

South Jakarta connects easily to **JORR**, **Antasari**, and **Sudirman** access roads. Families often hire full-time drivers due to traffic convenience and safety.

Groceries

- Expat supermarkets: **Ranch Market, Kem Chicks, Grand Lucky**
- Affordable options: **Lotte Mart, Transmart, Superindo**
- Imported items (cheese, cereal, dairy): **20–40% premium**

Dining & Social Life

- Brunch cafés: **Rp 150–250k/person**
- Fine dining: **Rp 700k–1M/person**
- Local meals: **Rp 40–70k**
- SCBD cocktails: **Rp 300–400k**

Utilities

- Electricity: **~Rp 2M/month** (varies by AC usage)
- Internet: **Rp 600–800k**
